Setting up parental controls allows you to limit or restrict the games your child can play based on the Entertainment Software Rating Board (ESRB) game rating categories. You can restrict interaction access for your child to chat, exchange photos, post photos, or connect to the Internet. Other features include blocking access to create new accounts and limiting the DVD movies a console can play.
